



If You're Over 50, You're at Risk for Colorectal Cancer

Getting Screened for the Disease Could Save Your Life

You could have colorectal cancer and not even know it. This is because colorectal cancer is a silent killer that rarely produces symptoms early on and can sneak up on you without warning. The statistics are frightening. This year, more than 56,000 Americans will die from colorectal cancer, and more than 140,000 new cases will be diagnosed. Alarmingly, about 75 percent of all new cases occur in men and women with no known risk factors for the disease, other than their age.

The good news is that colorectal cancer is one of the most preventable cancers, especially when detected early. According to the American Society of Colon and Rectal Surgeons (ASCRS), men and women over the age of 50 are considered at "average risk" for developing colorectal



cancer and should begin getting annual screenings beginning at age 50. The key to stopping this killer is early detection. With today's screening techniques, colorectal surgeons can detect and remove pre-cancerous polyps before they become dangerous, and then can reduce colorectal cancer deaths dramatically. In addition, eating a low-fat, high-fiber diet, coupled with regular exercise can significantly reduce your risk of developing the disease.
